Footnotes

1) For the 2011 Census, a usual resident of the UK is anyone who, on Census Day, was in the UK and had stayed or intended period of 12 months or more, or had a permanent UK address and was outside the UK and intended to be outside the UK for 12 months or more.

2) The 2011 Census estimates include the number of people believed to be missing from the initial census counts, for example their questionnaire. In 2011, it was thought that 6.3 per cent of the total population were missed from the initial census counts to the estimates. This undercounting does not occur uniformly across all geographic areas or age groups.

3) In 2011, census respondents were asked to provide their date of birth, from which their age on Census Day was derived.

4) For the purposes of the population chart, a split of the Census Day population estimate for persons aged 80 and over into 80 to 84 and over age groups has been derived on the basis of the current (2001 Census-based) Mid-Year Population Estimates for 2011.

5) Figures in this table may not add exactly because they have been rounded to the nearest 1,000.
